

WARREN AND ARTHUR SMADBECK

Warren and Arthur Smadbeck were New York City developers who had taken over their father's realty business, known as the Home Guardian Company.

They were the first suburban developers to conceive the idea of offering low-cost suburban homesites to the general public. In the early 1900's they bought and developed tracts close to suburban railroad stations. Later, as the public took to the highways, they created developments in the suburbs adjoining main roads, building lakes and recreation facilities which the purchasers could enjoy.

They were known in the media as "The Henry Fords of Real Estate" because of their style

of making vacation land and home ownership possible for the average person.

The New York Daily Mirror, a popular daily tabloid newspaper, joined the effort with the Smadbeck Brothers and published advertisements for The Lake Parsippany project. The Mirror Holding Company purchased the farmland that would later become a lake community of 7,916 Lots that measured 20' x 100', a typical New York City lot size. At an advertised price of \$98.50 each, the project was an instant success.

Time capsule (Cont.)

The Smadbeck brothers continued to build recreational communities in the area. Some of their developments include Lake Parsippany in Morris County, NJ, Lake Carmel in Putnam County, New York, Lake Peekskill in the town of Putnam Valley, NY, Putnam Lake in Patterson, NY, Mastic Park, Mastic Beach, North Shore Beach, Fire Island Pines and several other developments in Suffolk County, Long Island, and Laval-Ouest a district in Laval, Quebec, Canada.

The projects were targeted towards average middle class families and were intended to be

communities of summer bungalows focused on recreational activities involving man-made lakes.

Over time, the firm of Warren and Arthur Smadbeck, created over 60 developments throughout The United States and Canada, sold more than 700,000 lots in 30 states, built over 75,000 homes and created a permanent population of over 500,000 people.


The class for anyone interested in using the club's kayaks throughout the summer will be held on Wednesday, June 16th.



BORN A CRIME

In May, Maureen Omaster welcomed us to her lovely patio near the lake on a warm almostsummer evening. It was great to see each other in person, face to face, while we discussed Trevor Noah's book Born a Crime. Such a contrast between our comfortable suburban lives in Parsippany, and his under the hardships of South Africa's apartheid, the policy of segregating the African majority from the colonial white minority through ruthlessly enforced laws. Some of our older members remembered efforts in the United States to discourage investment in South Africa during this time, or to impose economic sanctions. It appears that young people, especially US schoolchildren, are not taught much about apartheid (Trevor Noah calls it "apart-hate"), which officially ended in the 1990s.

Trevor Noah was born in 1984 to an African woman and a Swiss-German man, a relationship that was illegal under apartheid; therefore, he was "born a crime." His mother and he developed brilliant strategies to help him get educated and "get religion" in a country where his skin color kept him from truly fitting in under rigid definitions of race imposed by the government. One strategy was to learn as many languages as possible. Young Trevor could speak Afrikaans, the language of the Dutch colonists; English, to fit in with the wider world; German, like his father; Xhosa like his mother; and four other local African languages, to fit in with the kids he met. Amazing! This started a discussion at

book club about languages in our lives. Many of us had parents or grandparents who spoke another language; several of us gave up on the other language because we felt we weren't truly American unless we spoke only English.

Many of were appalled at the poverty he his

family suffered, and the food he and his friends ate—sometimes caterpillars, sometimes the head of a goat ... but when we started talking about "ethnic delicacies" from our own families' cultures we realized many of them included things like eyeballs, the marrow of a bone, snails ... So maybe we had more in common with Trevor Noah than we realized. We usually discuss more appetizing food at book club, and missed our "Informationist" who often lists all the food in each book and encourages us to bring some to the meeting. Maybe next time.

Trevor Noah's facility with language, sense of humor and spirit of adventure led him to become a comedian, at first in South Africa and then eventually in the USA. I'm a big fan, but several book club members had never heard of him before reading the book. His shows during the pandemic have welcomed us to "The Daily Social Distancing Show, from Trevor Noah's couch in New York, to yours in the world," and it's easy to imagine people watching in many different countries. You might want to watch his show, on Comedy Central, or read the book for yourself.

An internet search shows that model builders are using 3d printing to make larger and larger parts for their model yachts. Some are actually printing the hull, keel and rudder. 3d printed boat


hulls start being built in many places in the US and abroad. Here is a photo of two 3d printed yachts built in France.


Over the winter we built a new larger printer so we can print larger parts too.


