The election process in 2022 was identical to the one followed for the last elections of 2020 and 2021. Election Buddy was hired to manage the administration of both elections. LPPOA mailed the nomination and ballot letters to all homes. Voting codes were mailed to all members in good standing. All mailings were mailed to the same address the LPPOA uses to deliver invoices. It is the homeowner's responsibility to ensure that LPPOA has the correct address on file.

In 2022, LPPOA mailed nomination letters to the same 2,200 homes of which only fifteen were returned. In 2022, there were approximately 1,680 eligible voters. Mailings sent to all property owners informing them of the following:

- 1) inform them of the upcoming election and
- 2) Nominated Candidates and
- 3) give members who are not in good standing with the LPPOA an opportunity to pay their dues and become members in good standing prior to the election.

There will be another election next year. We would like to get started earlier in the next cycle and could use the assistance of volunteers from the community. Please join us then. The detailed election results are attached here.

On election day the winner of District 4 was deemed to be disqualified for residing in the wrong district and the write-in candidate Thomas Wall is the winner.



LAKE PARSIPPANY PROPERTY OWNERS ASSOCIATION'S ANNIVERSARY.

There is probably no community in the world that is not affected by newspapers. This community however, was created by The Daily Mirror Co. to bolster circulation of their newspaper. In 1931, The New York Daily Mirror purchased land from the Hensler Beer estate and a portion of the Bates Farm to offer low-cost suburban homesites to the general public.



Time Capsule (Cont.)

It took the Mirror Co. two years to dig a lakebed out of the swamp and marsh sections of the farms and erect three dams before the lake was established. When the lake was finally completed in 1933, it was surrounded by 7,916 lots available to anyone agreeing to subscribe for six months at a cost of \$98.50 for a 20'x100' lot. A minimum of two lots was required to build a bungalow.

In the early development of the community, most families used their property as a summer retreat. Members of the L.P.P.O.A. were given a key with their membership cards and used that to go down to the clubhouse with cans for drinking water. There was no electricity or telephones until about 1937.

On October 19, 1933, the Certificate of Incorporation was signed. The certificate was filed with the Morris County Clerk's Office on October

25th, 1933. On October 29th, 1933, at a meeting at Lake Parsippany, to which all lot owners were invited, and which was attended by about fifteen hundred people, an incorporated organization of lot owners was formed and the Board of Trustees for the first year chosen.

With all those dates listed, you may be asking yourself. On what day does the LPPOA celebrate its Anniversary? Most corporations celebrate on the date of filing the Certificate of Incorporation, Google celebrates on different days in September every year based on milestones (day the project began, domain registration, incorporation, etc.), and the LPPOA celebrates on October 29th, the day the community came together to officially form the association.

ABOUT BLUEGILLS



Bluegill fish are a very popular fish caught by our lake younger anglers. Generally found closer along the shoreline they bring excitement to the youngsters. Fishing generally introduces these young adults to the benefits of our service to conservation.

Here's Info as posted by the US Fish and Wildlife Service about bluegills

Bluegill are a popular sport fish in many lakes and ponds. The common length for bluegill is 7.5 inches (19.1 centimeters) with the maximum reported length being 16 inches (41 centimeters). The name bluegill comes from the bluish region on the cheek and gill cover. They are a deep, slab-sided (tall and flat) fish with a small mouth. The heaviest published weight for a bluegill is 4 pounds 12 ounces (2.2 kilograms).

Bluegill are prolific breeders and normally spawn in late spring through and early summer when water temperatures rise within the range of 65 to 80 degrees Fahrenheit (18 to 26 degrees Celsius). A male bluegill will sweep or fan out a 6 to 12 inch diameter dish shaped nests. Once the bluegill nest has been established, the female will enter the nest and deposit her eggs, which is where the male fertilizes her eggs with his milt (sperm). The male bluegill will aggressively defend their nests against any intruders that come near the nest. Bluegill are considered colony spawners, meaning 50 or more males may construct their nest in one location. Bluegill can live up to 11 years with average lifespan of 5 to 8 years.
