

If you store a kayak on lake property don't forget it must be removed by November 15th.



Kayak Club (Cont.)



In accordance with the Rules and Regulations of the LPPOA, all boats MUST be removed from the property by November 15, or they will be removed and you will have to pay \$75 to get yours back. If a boat is not claimed within 90 days of November 15, it will be sold. You can use your boat after the November 15 date, as long as the lake is free of ice, but you cannot store it on the property.

ABOUT WHITE PERCH


Another fish currently residing at Lake Parsippany is the White Perch. Like the bluegill, the White Perch is a popular fish caught by our lake's younger anglers as these fish love live bait.

These are usually 7-10 inches long, olive to silvery green, brassy sides and white belly deep body (deepest under first dorsal fin) no dark stripes on adults two dorsal fins, barely connected: first with 8-10 strong spines. White Perch are a small silvery, greenish-gray fish with a dark, highly domed back.

Here's Info as posted by the NJ Division of Fish and Wildlife about White Perch Fish.

- begin spawning run in spring as water temperatures rise,
- eggs hatch in 1-6 days juveniles will stay near hatching grounds through summer and fall spend much of their lives in the same area where they hatched
- winter in deeper waters
- live an average of 10 years; but can live up to 17 years
- This species lives in lakes and streams as far west as Nebraska and as far south as
- Alabama and in all the Great Lakes. Many lakes and waterways are stocked with this fish.



Nominations for the First Annual LPPOA Volunteer Service Recognition is open – Tell us who to thank!

Recently the Board of Trustees approved a proposal to annually recognize those individuals who have generously given of their time, talent, and resources to the LPPOA. We need you to nominate the people you know who deserve recognition by ending us a letter of nomination.

The Volunteer Recognition Committee is seeking nominees for the following Service Recognitions (basic criteria for receiving the honor included):

LIFETIME VOLUNTEER SERVICE HONOR – Given to a long-time member for more than 20 years of volunteer service to the Association and outstanding accomplishment in promoting the Association.

- 1. The individual must have a member of the Association for at least 20 years,
- 2. The individual should have spent considerable amount of volunteer time in service to the Association over the life of their membership,
- 3. The individual should be seen as a leader in the LPPOA community or greater Parsippany community,
- 4. The individual should have at some time during the membership been a strong advocate for the Association to the greater community,
- 5. More than one recognition may be granted in a given year; however, great care must be taken not to lessen the esteem of the recognition by freely giving it out too often.

LPPOA Volunteer Service Recognition (Cont.)

OVERALL VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR – For outstanding volunteer service to the Association.

- 1. Exemplify the qualities of volunteerism and commitment to the LPPOA Community,
- Took on a specific project, event, or activity without the individual's participation the event, project, etc. would not have happened or been successful,
- 3. The individual's participation level in the event or the Association exceeds that of all others in the Association for the recognition year.

CLUB/TEAM/COMMITTEE MEMBER OF THE YEAR – For outstanding volunteer service to a specific club/team/committee, submitted by the club/team/committee.

- 1. An individual who in the estimation of the nominating group has gone above and beyond the activity level of other members to foster a stronger group or activity.
- 2. One individual from each group shall be recognized as runners up to the individual recognized as above all others.

FRIEND OF THE LAKE CERTIFICATE – Given to any individual or organization, member or not, who has given of their time, talent, or resources in service to the organization. All nominated parties not otherwise honored will receive this certificate along with any other individual or organization nominated.

BOARD MEMBER OF THE YEAR – For outstanding service to the Board of Directors by a member of the Board.

- 1. Faithfully executed the duties of their board position
- 2. Attended 75% of all board meetings
- 3. Went significantly above and beyond the requirements of their position during the year
- 4. Only 1 Board Member may be recognized in any given year.


collaborating with Don Phelps.


